PAM SANDYS – retirement after 20 years of service with AVA



Pam Sandys has tendered her resignation to AVA after almost 20 years of service – a truly outstanding achievement.

Pam's involvement with AVA began in November 2000 when her late husband, Alan, was diagnosed with asbestosis. The devastating news of a terminal disease was made more distressing as they had never been aware of anything but mesothelioma being associated with asbestos exposure and feared the worst.

She saw a notice in the local Messenger paper about a recently formed group in Salisbury for victims of asbestos-related diseases – this was the foundation of AVA. Pam & Alan were able to access relevant information and emotional support, along with legal advice and recommendation to a local general practitioner who was treating asbestos victims. After Alan's death Pam wanted to give something back to AVA. She has been an essential member of the team since that time.

Pam held the position of Office Manager for AVA all of those 20 years and had direct contact with people from all sectors of life, giving advice and support to those who had been affected in some way through exposure to asbestos. Pam was also an active member of the SA Asbestos Coalition. She has been passionately involved in taking every opportunity for members of the public to be aware of asbestos safety by attending field days, Home Shows and conferences, and representing AVA in Canberra to promote changes in laws regarding dust and asbestos controls.

Thank you, Pam. We will miss your friendly, calming presence, and wish you every happiness in your new home in the country.

National Centre for Asbestos Related Diseases (NCARD)

The National Centre for Asbestos Related Diseases is located in the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Perth, within the Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital. It is part of the University of Western



Australia. We were fortunate to have a tour around the NCARD laboratories whilst visiting Perth for the National Conference.

In addition to Professors Jenette Creaney, Bruce Robinson, Gary Lee and Anna Nowak, there are several Masters students and ten PhD graduate students engaged in different lines of research on asbestos related diseases, as well as other lung conditions: cystic fibrosis, asthma, COPD and lung cancer. The graduate students come from Mexico, Syria, the UK, Singapore, Malaysia, Cambodia, Canada, Iran and Western Australia. This keen and energetic meeting of minds offers great hope for the future.

NCARD has been studying Wittenoom workers and ex-residents since the 1970s – approximately 12,000 people. Almost 5,000 people have been screened and about 1,500 are still followed up annually. Research based on this data has changed the understanding of asbestos related disease. NCARD has created a biobank of patient samples to facilitate research aimed at delivering improved clinical outcomes to people of Western Australia and around the world.

Research is the only way to find new treatments and cures for lung disease. NCARD is a non-government, not-for-profit organisation, which relies on the generosity of the community, corporate organisations and foundations to continue to deliver life-changing research.

2019 National Asbestos Conference – Perth Convention Centre, November 2019

The 2019 Asbestos Safety Conference was held in November 2019 at the Perth Convention & Exhibition Centre, located on the waterfront in Perth. Three of our volunteers attended.

The conference welcomed more than 250 domestic and international professionals from a range of sectors including work health & safety, public health, local government and the environment.

Conference delegates heard from international and local industry experts throughout the three-day programme. A highlight was the official launch of the Australian Government's National Strategic Plan for Asbestos Awareness and Management 2019-23 (the NSP). Delegates had the opportunity to focus on Australia's NSP and the important roles and responsibilities all members of the asbestos management system have in working together toward preventing exposure to asbestos fibres in order to eliminate asbestos related diseases.

The three-day programme also included a Summer Garden Social Event which provided valuable networking opportunities for delegates, and a trade show exhibition featuring 14 exhibitors displaying a range of practices, products and services from across the industry.

AVA volunteers at the conference were impressed with the speakers and presentations - a great way for us to increase our knowledge.

The Asbestos Safety Conference in Perth in November 2019 provided a valuable opportunity for the various asbestos support groups from all around Australia to meet up face to face to exchange news and make plans for 2020. It is heartening to know we are not on our own in this battle. AVA volunteers met with representatives from ACV GARDS (Gippsland Asbestos Related Diseases Support Inc), ADRI (Asbestos Diseases Research Institute), ADSA (Asbestos Diseases Society of Australia), ADSSA (Asbestos Diseases Society of SA), AFT (Asbestos Free Tasmania), AMAA (Asbestosis & Mesothelioma Assn of Australia) and the Reflections through Reality Foundation. These groups have regular teleconferences but it is so much better to meet in person.

Senator Rex Patrick

It was a very special day for Catherine Wegener when she took a seat in the Senate Chamber in Parliament House, Canberra, to hear Senator Rex Patrick share her husband's story. Rex Wegener

was exposed to asbestos during his working life as a carpenter, which led to a diagnosis of mesothelioma.

Catherine said it was a very moving experience to witness her husband's story being presented by Senator Patrick and she hoped it would raise further awareness about the risks associated with asbestos.

Since losing Rex in 2017, Catherine has been actively involved with AVA and is AVA's representative on the Fleurieu.
